

# Heddon Valley, North Devon

A comfortable two mile walk down to the sea and back from the Hunter's Inn following the Heddon River through sessile oak woods and river meadows. The oaks were last cut about 100 years ago for use in the tanning industry, for pit props and for building.

**Getting there:**

**Road:** Road halfway between Coombe Martin and Lynton off the A39 – head for Hunter's Inn

**Car parks:** Hunter's Inn

**Foot:** South West Coast Path

**Bus:** not available close to the property

**Rail:** Barnstaple

**Maps and start grid ref:** OS Landranger 180 gr SS655483, Explorer OL 9

**Facilities available:** From Easter to end October National Trust shop, information centre and toilets at Hunter's Inn

**Terrain:** Easy walking conditions but good footwear advised

**Distance:** 2 miles

**Accessibility:** Height gain of 10 m over the walk. If on the beach beware of strong currents and 'dump' waves, don't swim at low tides and do not use inflatables. Cliffs are dangerous- children should be supervised

**Points of interest:** Follow path from the car park to the right of Hunters Inn and down to river. Continue to follow path downstream, looking for the following features:

1. Oak woods and some ash trees in abandoned fields. Rare whitebeams can also be found in the woods
  2. Heddon's Mouth- shingle beach with Limekiln- limestone was imported from South Wales and burnt to form lime to improve the local acid soils
  3. Waterside meadows- full of many wildflowers in high summer
- Return to car park on walk on other side of the stream
